## History of the Ballard School Systems.

With the new 23 million dollar Ballard High School being completed in September 20, 2011; we will take a look at the history of schools in the Ballard School District.



Early settlers were interested in providing a good education for their children so in the summer of 1857; the Norwegian Palestine congregation erected the first school just across from the Palestine church.

The history of Story County shows a seminary building in the 1850's, in the town plat of the village of Palestine which was located west of the Ballard Golf & Country Club but a failure in finances caused it to dissolve.

There was a Palestine school located where the Ballard Golf & Country Club is located before the town of Huxley had a school.

The Fjeldberg School with the  $1^{\rm st}$ - $8^{\rm th}$  grades was established in about 1865 not far from the current Fjeldberg cemetery south of Huxley. This school even existed when an independent school district was established in the town of Huxley in the 1880's.

Most of the students in the early schools came from farming families and the rural schools, which were 2 miles apart. These "country schools" provided education through the 8<sup>th</sup> grade only. Those who wanted more education often went to academia or to colleges where high school studies were available.

When Huxley was incorporated in 1882, the school district line divided the town. Children who lived on the south side of the line had to go one mile south to the Fjeldberg School and those on the north had to go a mile north to the Palestine School.

One of the requirements of the pioneer teachers was "that he or she were able to ride a horse and shoot a gun" because of prowling Indians and wild animals as the teacher traveled



back and forth. In 1865, in Palestine township there were only ten male teachers and three female teachers. Their salary at that time was \$10-12 a month.

The 1<sup>st</sup> school in the town of Huxley was located in far southwest corner of Huxley at south 5<sup>th</sup> and Railway. It was a one-room structure and had about 25 students of all ages attending.

In 1908 a two-story brick building was constructed at North Main Ave and 5<sup>th</sup> street which could serve grades one through twelve, but there were no students in the upper grades and no twelfth grade graduation in Huxley until 1922.

By 1918 the demand for more education was increasing so much that Huxley voted to consolidate the rural district schools with the town school. In order to accomplish this, a new, more modern building was built just south of the 1908 school and was finished in the fall of 1921 at a cost of \$150,000.

The school included a home economics laboratory, a Smith-Hughes agriculture department, a science laboratory, and a new gymnasium which was the best in Story County and was so outstanding the Story County Basketball tournament was held in Huxley.

In 1957, the Huxley school district was reorganized to include the towns of Cambridge, Kelley, Slater and Huxley. The first graduating class wasn't until 1959 and the junior high and senior high were both located in the Huxley High school building. The 1st day of the Ballard community school was Sept. 2. 1958.



A new modern high school was built just north of the old Hux-

ley school building in 1962. The Huxley High school building served as the Jr. High and administration building until 1975 when a new junior high was added to the new high school building. The elementary grades continued in Cambridge, Kelley and Slater.

In November 2011, a new state-of-the-art 23 million dollar school was built just northwest of the football field on a 40-acre tract of land.

Ballard High School has good community support for all of its sports and scholastic events and has helped produce outstanding musicians, medical doctors, college professors, teachers, scientists, business people, engineers, lawyers, and trade professionals. We have every right to be proud of our history of education in the city of Huxley, Iowa and the Ballard School District.

## Plat maps from 1902 and 1908 show schools at the following locations in Palestine Township.

- #4 On the south east side of the intersection of what is now hwy 210 and hwy 69
- #6 On the north side of current hwy 210 about 1.75 Miles west of hwy 69.
- #5 On the north west side of the gravel roads 530th Ave and 310th street
- #9 On the east side of R38 and the north side of 310th Street.
- #10 On the east side of R38 and the south side of  $290^{\text{th}}$  Street (which doesn't continue to R38 any more)
- #2 On the south east side of gravel roads 530th Ave and 290th St.
- #1 On the south side of gravel road 290th St. and about .5 mile east of the current hwy 69.
- (Number not indicated) On the East side of current Hwy 69 just south of Ballard creek in the current Ballard Golf And Country Club area.
