

Huxley Grows

When Huxley was founded in 1882, the village consisted of four blocks beginning on the East with First Avenue and extending West to Fourth Avenue. It was properly plotted and recorded by the Milwaukee Land Company. In 1885, Block 5, the 1st addition was added to the West, and Fifth Avenue was created.





The Huxley Land Company formed in 1906. Peter T. Brown was president and A.E. Nass was secretary. Other members were A. L. Kloster, John V. Kalsem, Lewis Berhow, Peter D. Johnson, Ole Eide and Nels Helland.

The first transaction was when John Dobbe purchased two lots on 2^{nd} Avenue and the framed schoolhouse was moved from South 5^{th} Avenue to 310 N. 2^{nd} Avenue.

Huxley was incorporated in 1902 and at that time became a town. By state law, in the 1970's, all incorporated villages and towns became cities, and Huxley was known as the City of Huxley.

In the early 1900'S, few services were needed. There was no water, sewer system, street lighting and no sidewalks until 1907. Huxley did not have a water system in





In 1920, the first water tower was built. In the late 1980's it was taken down and a new water tower was built. Also, in 1920, a new city hall was built with a jail in the basement. That building still exists and is located just north of Huxley Communications who now owns the building.

In 1959-60, a sanitary sewer system and treatment plant was constructed. I remember it was a rainy Fall and people had to park their vehicles on the side of Highway 69 because the streets were impassable. A new sewer plant was built in 2004 and is located east of Interstate 35 on the Cambridge road.

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MISSION STATEMENT: To engage the Community of Huxley, Iowa in the preservation, education, and celebration of our heritage and ancestry. To preserve for research and education, the artifacts, information, and verbal histories about the lives of the people of Huxley from its pioneer origins to the present day and into our future.

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After a fire destroyed the Fjeldberg Church in 1945, the town provided a fire station to house a new fire truck and in April 1946 an International fire truck was purchased and the Huxley Fire Department was organized. Palmer Saveraid was fire chief and Punkin Fjelland, Doc Fjelland, Ronald Fjelland, Beverley Hill, Marion Hill, Irwin Hill, Donald Tesdall, Bob Christiansen, Orval Elliot, Lawrence Ness and Milo Veland were volunteer fire fighters.

In 1890, Huxley was a village of 50-75 Norwegians. By 1900, the population was 199. In 1930 - 362, 1940 - 392, 1950-422. In 1959, when I was a senior in the first graduation class of Ballard Community School, the population was 486. In 1970, it increased to 937. Huxley really grew from 1970-1980 to 1,884, when Arnold Ihle developed subdivisions north of Highway 69 and Charles Raker developed subdivisions south of Nord Kalsem Park. Population increased to 2,047 by 1990. From 1990-2007, the population was 2,959 when Steve Quick developed Ashwood Estates and Larson's subdivisions.

Northview development, Trailridge development, Westview Heights, Ironridge, and Bella Vista development increased the population to approximately 4,500 in 2018.

In 10 years, the population is projected to be 7,000.

City Allows Historical Memorabilia to be Displayed at Nord-Kalsem Community Center

The Huxley Historical Society currently displays historical items in the Hub which is located in the 3C's building. However, that small space cannot hold all the items that could be displayed. Recently, the Historical Society approached the Huxley City Council about displaying the overflow of memorabilia that the Society has accumulated inside the Nord-Kalsem shelter house. Thankfully, the Council gave the nod of approval for the Society to use the south side of the community center.

The Society plans to display historical photos and stories of military service men and women from Huxley. There is also plans to display pictures and memorabilia from the historic Huxley Horse Show. Funds generated from the horse show between the years 1942-1956 were used to build the original shelter house in Nord-Kalsem Park.

Since the City has allowed the Historical Society to use the Nord-Kalsem shelter house, the Society would like to improve the landscaping around the facility. Monies from the Historical Society treasury will be used to fund this project which will improve the looks of the area around Nord-Kalsem Park.
