

# Ballard's First Graduating Class - 1959


It was on September 2, 1958, that the first senior class came together at the old Huxley High School.

Huxley and Kelley had already come together several years before that. Slater and Cambridge

students joined us that September day to form the first and "the best" class ever at Ballard.



Of the 53 classmates, there were 23 from Huxley, 7 from Kelley, 10 from Cambridge, and 13 from Slater. There were 29 boys and 24 girls in the class of '59 that graduated from Ballard High School on Friday, May 22, 1959.


Since it was the first year of Ballard High School, there was no homecoming. Instead, a school carnival was held. The first king and queen of the carnival royalty were Ray Cruse and Rowena Accola, held in November, 1958.

The fall of 1958 was especially important for me because Ballard fielded its first football team. None of the prior schools had football before the reorganization.

Ballard's first football game was September 19, 1958 at the Nite Hawk Baseball Park where we defeated United Community School 15-12 with over 1,000 people attending who overflowed the portable bleachers. Ray Cruse and I were the first co-captains of the Ballard football team and Dean Cramer was the first coach. Ron Rosenfeld, a freshman, scored the first touchdown for Ballard on a 12 yard run.




Westvold, Ray Cruse, Monte Lantz, John Kalsem, Richard Steensland, and Nels Nord.



The girls basketball team of 1958-1959 were outstanding and went to the state tournament with a record of 24-1 before being beat out by State Champs, Gladbrook. Seniors on that Ballard High School team were Colleen Tweedt, Gayla Richardson, and Patti Locker, and were the first tri-captains of the team. David Blackman was the coach of the girls. While the team was attending the girl's state tournament, a snow storm dumped 15 inches of snow in central Iowa. The basketball team and cheerleaders were stranded at Vets Auditorium on the final night of the championship, so a sock-hop was started to keep the patrons occupied, which lasted all night.

The boys' basketball coach was Elwood Sapp. The seniors on the team were Larry Shaeffer, Ron Rude, Al Finch, Ray Cruse, Larry Larson and Terry Jennings. The team had a record of 13 wins and 7 losses.

When Cambridge, Slater, Kelley and Huxley consolidated in the fall of 1958, our senior class of 1959 really got along great, even though we were rivals for so many years.

The class of "59" has had class reunions every five years since we graduated. It has been 60 years since the class of "59" graduated. We had our 60<sup>th</sup> class reunion on July 6, 2019 and 21 classmates attended.

We, unfortunately, have lost 14 of our 53 classmates.

We all will cherish the memories we had as the first class to graduate from Ballard High School.




# POSTCARDS OF YESTERYEAR

Paul Jacobson was born April 30, 1929 to Rev. Hiram and Marjorie Jacobson, who served the Palestine congregation from 1939 to 1949. Paul was an only child. Paul graduated from Huxley High School in 1947.

Paul was a First Lieutenant in the Air Force when he was shot down while piloting an F-86 Fighter Jet over North Korea on February 12, 1953. He was never found – missing in action.

Even though Paul was an only child, he spent a lot of time with his neighbor and friend, Omar Brendeland and Omar's family.




