a word from our president

Enclosed are excerpts from a letter David Johnson, who graduated from Huxley High School in 1949, wrote to Owen John Kalsem & Omar & Valerie (Fjelland) Brendeland about early years in the Huxley area and how his mother was in Norway District No. 1 School which was South of Huxley.

He writes that "my own life was lived as being part of the Evergreen country school neighborhood; the Kelley Lutheran church where my Johnson grandparents, my father's two brothers and one sisters family belonged and I went to Vacation Bible School; Huxley Consolidated School where I graduated from High School; Bethesda Lutheran Church in Ames where I went to Sunday School, was confirmed, and was married; Washington Township where I was involved in 4-H as a child and farmed for seven years after High School".

He told the story of how his



mother, girl of German background from Grimes, Iowa, met his father in Huxley. Valerie said her mother attended one of the country schools south of Huxley and we wondered if she was a student of my Mother's.

In my family memorabilia we have the copy of my mother's teaching contract for the year 1920-1921, signed by O. J. Kalsem, President of the Board of Directors, which I thought you would be interested in. Also her Uniform County Teacher's Certificate, and a two inch by three inch print of a photo of several children posing in front of Norway Dist. No.1 school. I made copies of these on my little home printer and typed a copy of the contract because the original carbon copy information did not show up very well.



The HHS also wants to thank members for all donations, project specific and general.

I don't believe this contract was for my mother's first year because she spoke about teaching at this one room school and later in a one room school that was moved in from the country and set up behind what you and I called the Old Building when we were in school. She and my father were also married December 31, 1921 and she did not teach after the end of the school year 1921-1922.

Based on my assumptions that Norway No. 1 had eight grades, that children began school when they were five years old, went on to High School, and graduated at age 18, one could assume that some of the children listed in our roster or Huxley High School Alumni graduating during the years 1925 through 1933 may have been students of my mothers in 1920.

My mother graduated from High School at Harold, Iowa, the small town that served Camp Dodge during World War 1. She then graduated from a six week summer course at Des Moines University and this qualified her to take the examination and become a grammar school teacher. I think she taught one year at the one room school north of Grimes she had attended and then accepted the position at Norway No. 1. She talked about packing her suitcase, taking the interurban from near the home farm to Des Moines, transferring to the Ft. Dodge, Des Moines and Southern (I believe it was called), getting off at a road crossing south of Huxley, walking to the Iverson farm on the East side of the highway South of Huxley where she roomed and boarded with the Iverson's.

I recall a few of her memories. She spoke English and understood a limited amount of German. The language spoken in the Iverson home was predominately Norwegian. This was also true of the homes her students came from. The Iverson's had a young immigrant Norwegian hired man who stayed in the other upstairs room.

At night he would play the most mournful tunes on his violin and she would sit in her room and cry, she was so homesick and so was he. In the winter she had to get up early, and walk to the school, start the fire in the stove to warm the building, and sat in the building bundled up in her coat waiting for it to warm up. In the fall after the corn was picked several big tall farm boys who could

barely speak English showed up and enrolled in school. They wanted to learn to read and write English.

One evening Mother and her sister were walking down Main Street in Huxley and two young men were driving their Model T up and down the street. They stopped and talked to the two girls. One of the boys was Neil Johnson, my father.

Mother kept track of the Iverson's and their daughter, Margaret, for years. They moved into Huxley and I think they lived near the High School.

One other item of interest has to do with my parent's purchase of their small 50 acre farm. When they were married in 1921, they moved to the farm just west of the highway on the road to Kelley. After a few years my father became ill and they had to give up farming. He was a hemophiliac, had a stiff knee and was troubled with severe health problems all of his life. Randall Thompson, a relative, let them move into a house he had where they just survived for a year or more and then my father got well enough to ride on a horse drawn farm implement and drive horses so he started doing day work for various farmers in the area. One of those, a man by the name of Ole Olson who lived on 40 acres on the West side of the highway North of Johnson Hill, said, "Neil, you are a good farmer. I am a good carpenter. I want you to buy my livestock, machinery, and crops as they stand in the field and move up here. I will move to Ames and become a full time carpenter". Then after a few years they were able to save up enough money deposited in the Huxley Bank to make a down payment on the 50 acre farm we lived on. This is where Huxley comes back into play. Dad and mom took their money out of the Huxley bank and made the down payment. They borrowed the rest of the money from my grandfather, Andrew K. Johnson, who also had his savings in the Huxley bank.

Shortly after they took the money out of the bank, the great depression happened and the bank failed. Both my parents and my grandfather would have lost their savings if they had left it in the bank. Even though my father and

mother paid way too much for the land, they had something. They did struggle along and paid Grandpa Andrew back. Even though my father and mother paid way too much for the land, they had something. They did struggle along and paid Grandpa Andrew back.

The Andrew Johnson family attended the Lutheran Church in Kelley. Several of my first cousins and their children attended school in Huxley and some are still in the community. My father and mother joined the family church in Kelley after they were married. The church conducted their worship in Norwegian. My father begged the Pastor and church council to have at least one service a month in English so my mother could fully participate. The church fathers couldn't make the change so my parents transferred to Bethesda Lutheran Church in Ames where they worshipped for the rest of their lives.

One last Huxley related story. My father, who probably left Evergreen school in the fourth grade, was elected to the Washington Township School Board where he served for at least twelve years. They had four one room schools – Evergreen located one-half mile east of Highway 69 and about a mile north of Johnson Hill; Grandview on the west side of Highway 69 just north of the road to the Ames Airport; Oakwood, south of the Campus and Wentworth School north of old Highway 30 west of the campus. During my father's last term on the school board, they went through the process of closing all four schools and dividing up the areas served between Huxley, Ames and Kelley school districts. Needless to say high emotions prevailed in the community over this.—END
